Speaker Debra Sayewich




How can we support you, to know that you are not forgotten?

First Nations Map, Representative First Nations Political Organizations, Tribal Council, Treaties

- The largest populations of Indigenous people in the province of Ontario reside in the North West LHIN approximately 21.5 % of the population size.
- This area also has the largest land mass with many of the communities in very remote areas.
- Don't ask me what you can do, come and see...
- We all need to know that we are not alone
- Understanding how current Indigenous issues impact Indigenous communities

Age-Friendly Community

Diversity of Health Services that also include home visits Community activities bringing together many generations.





Age-Friendly Community



- Create an age-friendly community by asking & listening, do not assume you know what resources are required
- Necessities of life, safe clean water to drink, wood for heating, healthy eating
- Water is our medicine? Would you shower with orange juice, coffee or tea?
- Are resources within walking distances or accessible transportation
- Affordable supports to remain at home
- Availability of Equipment and Aids
- Housing adapted for seniors and those with disabilities
- Assisted transportation, accessible, affordable, services that are available day or evening
- Seniors receive "social" visits

Age-Friendly Community



- A buddy system, phone check-in
- Phone base programming Bingo, Storytelling, Biography, News in the community
- Activities are well-publicized, remember not everyone owns a computer or has internet
- Program development, Train the trainer
- Remember not to become an ember (caregiver burnout support)
- Meals on Wheels Friendly meal program at a minimal fee (5 or 6 meal plan)
- Delivery services groceries, pharmacy
- Senior safety officer
- Snow removal, yard maintenance
- Food banks 2 -3 times per week



Long-Term Care Homes Act s.24(1)

Any person who has reasonable grounds to suspect that abuse has occurred, or may occur, shall immediately report the suspicion and the information upon which it was based to the Director under the LTCHA.

Retirement Homes Acts.67

Anyone who sees or suspects a situation that harms or puts a resident at risk of harm must report it to the RHRA.
