


Older women and domestic homicide

We need to understand gender differences to address and prevent violence more effectively


Gender is a factor

- Men experience highest overall rates of violence are most likely to be killed by another male (Stats Canada)
- Women are more at risk of domestic violence, sexual assault and harassment (Canadian Women's Foundation)
- Women are more likely to be killed by a partner/ex-partner.
- 80% of domestic homicide victims involved women, with an even higher percentage of accused men
- LGBT people experience similar rates of domestic violence



8 women or girls were killed by men for every month in 2019 About half of them were killed by an intimate partner Age distribution of women and girls killed by male accused / offenders compared with general population




Mercy killing likely in couple's murdersuicide




Structural Violence

The idea that domestic violence only affects younger women is due in part to systemic ageism that operates as structural violence in excluding oldage cohorts from study samples.

Global and national surveys of intimate partner violence have included women only up to the age of 49.











Sector Differences





Health professionals working most closely with seniors are not usually trained to recognize warning signs and risk factors of domestic violence





Equity-oriented education across disciplines is a strategic direction that has the potential to bridge long-standing research and sector tensions by anchoring education in human rights.

An equity orientation provides the foundation for the development of shared principles and practices using a common language that is well versed in the relationship between social location, trauma, and violence at all levels of society

Universal precautions:


- Everyone has had trauma of some kind
- You don't have to know their story to be caring
- People don't do things without reason



Most common risk factors for lethality

- A history of domestic violence
- Actual or pending separation
- Obsessive behaviour
- Depression of the perpetrator
- The level of violence is increasing
- Prior threats / attempts of suicide
- Threat to kill
- Prior attempts to isolate victim
- Victim had intuitive sense of fear
- Perpetrator unemployed

Most common risk factors for lethality








