

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

Speaker

JOAN CHANDLER, Producer, director, writer, facilitator, founding and Artistic Director of Sheatre

Joan's unique specialty is community arts for social change – specifically interactive Forum Theatre productions about social issues, and works that celebrate community and the creative spirit. Joan has a keen ability to work with groups, collaboratively spinning new plays with, by and about ordinary people, that tell their own authentic, galvanizing stories.

She is also an award-winning script writer. Joan has produced, directed and co-facilitated the creation of 115 plays across Ontario and abroad, reaching audiences of over 150,000, primarily to underserved audiences in rural and small urban environments.



Speaker

david sereda, ARTISTIC ASSOCIATE / CO-PRODUCER

david is a singer, songwriter, pianist and composer.

He is a distinctive voice in music and theatre in Canada. He has recorded albums of his original songs, written and directed musicals, and performed in concerts and festivals across Canada and the USA. He is associate artist with the community arts company, Sheatre. He has produced over 40 Stray Dog Salons in Toronto and Owen Sound, exuberant thematic cabarets that bring together musicians, writers, playwrights and dancers.

He leads choral workshops, Song Circles, where community singers learn and sing songs through call and response. He has a long artistic history with novelist and poet Anne Michaels – including three recent performances at the Toronto International Festival of Authors. He finds inspiration in the wonders of the everyday and received an Ontario Arts Council grant to compose songs about "living in the storm of the world".

david lives in Grey County, Ontario, close to Georgian Bay.










Episode One: "Physical Abuse by a Family Member"

The story: Fred, a man with a dark secret, bumps into his old friend Doris at a seniors' residence. As they reminisce about their days in a musical society, Fred learns what happened to a once dear friend at the hands of her sister.

Issues: care partner burnout, abandonment, physical abuse, dementia Experts: talk about ways to intervene and help.

Episode Two: "The Toll of Isolation, Scams and Greed"

The story: Fred's admiration for Doris grows when he witnesses her response to a street altercation and hears how she rescued farm-bound Charlie during a blizzard. She asks Fred to help her solve a problem. Issues: isolation, scams, disrespect of elders, family abuse Experts: talk about available services and the role of neighbours, friends and family in helping to respond.



"Granny" entertains with stories, lively characters and familiar songs in episodes 1–3. Each deals with distinct kinds of abuse.

Episode Three: "Financial Abuse and The Fear Pandemic"

<u>The story:</u> Can Fred help? Things are falling apart as Doris searches for a way to calm Fred's storm-clouds while she organizes a big variety show concert for the residents. A newer resident suffers when she can't get to church. Can they sing the blues away at the outdoor concert?

<u>Issues:</u> fear during COVID-19, power of attorney, mental health <u>Experts:</u> discuss helpful strategies


Episodes 4 and 5 stimulate further discussion. The series as a whole provides a framework for listeners to better understand

Episode Four: "Mental Health, Caregiver Stress, and the Role of Neighbours, Friends and Family"

Experts discuss the issues and offer their thoughts and advice.

Episode Five: "Financial Abuse, Social Determinants of Health, Benefits of Technology"

Experts discuss the issues in a round table, and offer their thoughts and advice.

How to organize the "Granny" program

- . Preview all five episodes yourself.
- Invite local community resource guest(s) to join your presentation.
- Do a test run with the method you plan to use to host the podcasts, such as Zoom, the phone or in-person.
- Collect informational materials for your audience members.
- . Prepare a list of resource contacts for the audience.
- Promote the podcast series to your members and to the community-at-large.

How to organize the "Granny" program

- Be clear about the topics. It's about prevention of the abuse of older adults and promoting support. Make sure they know that it's an audio drama, like a radio drama, and that the situations might be worrying to some people. Let them know that local community support people will be present.
- Listen to each podcast in full with your members.
- Time now for discussion and Q&A. Have your area's community "experts" attend to answer questions after the podcast, and to do individual follow-up if needed.

How to organize the "Granny" program

- Offer local contact information at the time of the podcast.
- Announce the Seniors Safety Line phone number at the start and the end of each presentation.
- Send out print information (from points 4 & 5) to all who attended, or to your Centre's mailing list.
- Please let Sheatre know how it went.

Reporting Abuse



Long-Term Care Homes Act s.24(1)

Any person who has reasonable grounds to suspect that abuse has occurred, or may occur, shall immediately report the suspicion and the information upon which it was based to the Director under the LTCHA.




Retirement Homes Acts.67
