



2

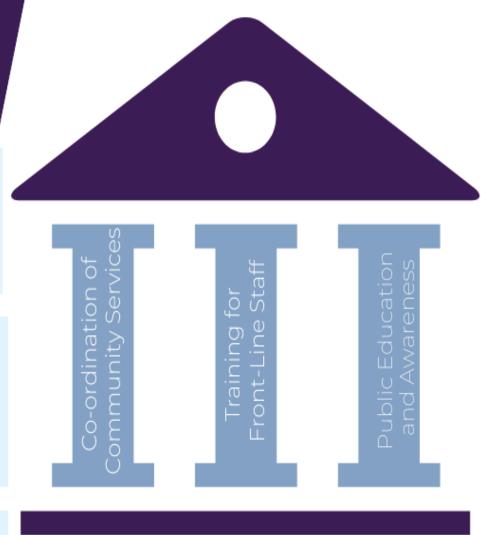
Training for Front-Line Staff


Co-ordination of Community Services

Lois found her source of joy and meaning in life very early: to help others become the people they were born to be. She began as a High School Counsellor and soon moved to Career Services for adults. At age 56, she started a company called Life Transitions and at age 92 she still does a few lifestyle planning presentations and appointments.

She encountered ageism 5 years ago when she moved into a Senior's Residence! That shifted her focus to people aged 65 to 95, who lack role models for the new longevity.

We need a new view of ageing for the last third of our lives. It will be better for our health and benefit the community and the economy if we avoid the stereotypes of ageing and allow people to grow and contribute at every age.








Painting the picture: video conferencing









- Skipping a generation removes power dynamics and the two age groups can meet and learn as equals.
- Programs can be adapted to any age, mobility, location, budget, time available.
- Youth self-confidence and interpersonal skills improve.
- Seniors report a renewed sense of purpose and value, and decreased depression and loneliness.
- Youth report increased likelihood to volunteer in the future.
- Seniors become a voice of encouragement and celebration in the lives of youth.
- Both youth and seniors report increased feelings of belonging to their community.
- The next generation of decision makers grow up age-friendly, dementia aware, compassionate and motivated!



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
